CHRIST SEIZER, furniture dealer, No. 473 First avenue; business established in October, 1873. Mr. Seizer is doing a prosperous business, amounting to \$3,000 per year. He carries about \$1,000 worth of stock. He was born in Germany, January 23, 1849, and came to Milwaukee in April, 1869. He was married in May, 1875, and has two daughters.

CHAS. H. WAGNER, of the firm of Chas. H. Wagner & Bro., No. 86 Mason street, dealers in frames of all kinds. He is a native of Hesse-Darmstadt, Germany. He came to New York in 1851, and to Milwaukee in 1855. He worked at the cabinetmaker's trade several years, and then established his present business, which he has since successfully conducted.

JACOB SCHWAAB, furniture manufacturer and dealer in wire mattrasses, No. 336 Reed street; business established in 1861, under the firm name of Fleck & Schwaab. Mr. Schwaab started from New York in 1861, with \$600. Upholstering lounges on his first trip, he went as far as Oshkosh, and took all the orders in four days.
